

English I honors



Course Description

Welcome to English 1 Honors with Mr. Benton! The purpose of this course is to provide relevant, rigorous instruction in English language skills including reading, writing, observing, and communicating in the content areas of literature and language. Visit <u>corestandards.org</u> for more information on the new ninth grade standards being covered in Pinellas County this year.

Enrolled students will:

- construct meaning from a range of rigorous texts (literary, technical, informative)
- use process writing to communicate complex ideas in a precise, organized, fluent manner
- respond critically and aesthetically to a variety of literary forms
- use his/her language skills for effective written, visual, and oral communication
- foster an ever-growing vocabulary through reading, discussion, and word study
- emerge prepared with the necessary literacy skills for future advanced courses and college

Classroom Policies

Make-up Work

It is completely the student's responsibility to obtain make-up work and to set up with Mr. Benton a time before or after school to make up quizzes, tests, notes, or other information missed due to an absence. If a student has missed a class, he/she should refer to the class schedule (visible in class and on the class website). However, if the student has questions about the assignment, has missed notes, or has missed a quiz or test, he/she will have to talk with Mr. Benton before or after (but not during) class. If a student is absent for a quiz, he or she has exactly one week to make it up.



Hall Passes

Students are allowed **3 hall passes** for every 6 week grading period. Students may use those hall passes at times of their own choosing. Unused hall passes will be converted into bonus points that will slightly boost that student's grade at the end of each grading period. Once the 3 passes have been used by the student, he/she will **not** be permitted to leave class for any reason. Students: use your freedom wisely!

Late Work

Homework that is one day late will receive a **50%-off** penalty. Work that is over one day late will **not** be accepted for a grade. This policy is strictly enforced. The **exceptions** to this rule are *some* long-term assignments (e.g. journal assignments,



typed papers) for which 15-40% (the percentage increases throughout the year at the teacher's discretion) will be deducted for each late day.

Grade Monitoring



Please keep in mind that a student's grades are visible online through Pinellas County's Focus interface (**focus.pcsb.org**). It is the student's responsibility to keep a close eye on his or her grades in this class. Most assignments will be entered into the gradebook within a week. Some lengthier assignments (such as journals and papers) may take up to two weeks to return.



Computer Access

Throughout the school year, students will be required to type up several journals and papers. If a computer is not available at home, computers will be available before and after school in the SPHS Library and in Mr. Benton's classroom.

Tutoring

Mr. Benton is available every Monday after school specifically for tutoring in regards to English 1 Honors (and other days are available upon request). Students: If you start to feel that you are falling behind in this class, act immediately! I'm here to help.



Academic Honesty

The nature of honors-level work often requires that students complete graded assignments outside of class. Students are expected to complete work without the assistance of others unless Mr. Benton specifically allows collaboration on an assignment. Sharing work with another student, "working together", "just trying to help", using any other student's work for reference (without express written permission from Mr. Benton), or using any other human's ideas — even from an online source — without specifically citing the source in proper MLA format will result in a "zero" on the assignment and a possible referral to an administrator.



Necessary Supplies

Students must come prepared to class every day! Supplies include:

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Every Day

- Composition book (college rule preferred)
- Notebook paper (college rule preferred)
- Blue or black pens
- Highlighters (2-3 different colors)
- Student planner (an organizer or agenda)*
- Folder to store notes, handouts, and work*

As Needed

- A set of colored pencils or markers
- Blank copy paper
- Currently assigned reading (See the book list on the next page.)

*the folder and planner may certainly be used for classes other than English as well

Title: Great Expectations
Author: Charles Dickens

This novel is needed by early September.



Title: Animal Farm

Author: George Orwell

This novel is needed by mid-November.



Title: Sir Gawain and the Green Knight
Translator: Burton Raffel

This book is available in several different translations; however, the required version is the translation by Burton Raffel.

This poem is needed by mid-December.



Title: Romeo and Juliet
Author: William Shakespeare

Any edition of the play is acceptable as long it contains the original text and not only a simplification.

This play is needed by mid-January.



Title: To Kill a Mockingbird


Author: Harper Lee




Wish List

Mr. Benton's Tips for a Great Year ...
