General Questions


Remember to copy down and underline the underlined portion of each <u>question</u> and to highlight all **"quotes"**. Answer every question in <u>1 or 2 complete sentences</u> unless otherwise instructed to simply "list" or "name" particular facts.

- 1) <u>What do you think it means to be a "gentleman"?</u> (This is your opinion, not Pip's or Charles Dickens's.)
- 2) In Ch. 11, Estella allows Pip to kiss her. What's ironic about how Pip feels afterwards?
- 3) One of the recurring themes of the novel is that "the past will continue to influence the present". Briefly discuss one specific event in Ch. 11-19 that is an example of that theme.
- 4) <u>Pip and Biddy have a long conversation in Ch. 17</u>. List 3 things Pip said that probably shocked, hurt, <u>or at least surprised Biddy</u>.
- 5) Provide a quote from Ch. 11-19 that is an example of Pip's sense of humor as the story's narrator,
- 6) Provide a quote from Ch. 11-19 that is a good example of a metaphor.

Creative Writing

Fill up at least **half a page** for each of these. You don't need to copy down the prompts for these two items.

- 7) Create a personal ad or social networking page for 16-year old Pip at this point in the story (as he leaves for London in Ch. 19). (*Things* to think about: Pip's personality, likes/dislikes, hobbies, his "type", etc.) Feel free to illustrate Pip's headshot.
- 8) Writing from Joe's point of view, answer the following question in detail: <u>What are your hopes and dreams for your friend Pip?</u>





The Quotes

For each quote – write it out and **highlight** it. Each answer should be a minimum of <u>three</u> complete sentences. (You don't need to copy down anything in parentheses. It's only there to help you answer more completely.) For each quote:

- Provide the **<u>context</u>** of the quote (how it appears in the story, what it means, who says it, to whom it was said, etc.).
- Explain the <u>meaning</u> of the quote. (Is there a hidden or deeper meaning? Why did the character say it?)
- Theorize about the <u>significance</u> of the quote (why it's important to the story as a whole).
- 9) "And sharper teeth than teeth of mice have gnawed at me." (What does Miss Havisham mean?)
- **10)** "You never had a chance before you came here, and see how improved you are!" (*include the effect this quote has the person it is spoken to*)
- 11) "I was truly wretched, and had a strong conviction on me that I should never like Joe's trade. I had liked it once, but once was not now." (*Explain how Pip feels here.*)
- 12) "She watched his countenance as if she were particularly wishful to be assured that he took kindly to his reception, she showed every possible desire to conciliate him."
- 13) "I fell into much the same confused division of mind ... so often between the forge and Miss Havisham's, and Biddy and Estella."





- **14)** "Because, if it is to spite her, I should think but you know best that might be better and more independently done by caring nothing for her words. And if it is to gain her over, I should think but you know best she was not worth gaining over." (*Be thorough in your explanation.*)
 - 15) "I am afraid sore afraid that this purpose originated in my sense of the contrast there would be between me and Joe ..." (What <u>specifically</u> is Pip thinking about here at the end of Ch. 19?)
